### PRESIDENT'S CORNER \_\_\_\_\_ Larry Roper

What an exciting and rewarding month March was. The Saint Patrick's Day playdates went very well. Folks continue to tell us how much they enjoy our performances. The Saint Patrick's performances were fun and offered an opportunity for a little Irish humor. Bob Hlavacek did a good job bringing out laughter at the performances with some jokes he told. We teased Bob about the Saint Patrick's playdate last year when he wished everyone a Happy Thanksgiving. Being the good sport he is, he told that story to the audience at the Maple Heights performance and at the end he wished everyone a Happy Saint Patrick's Day and a Happy Thanksgiving. Thanks for the laughs Bob.

We have replenished our supply of our traditional CDs with an additional 1000 copies. The profits we made from CD sales last year provided more than enough to cover production costs. This supply should last for a few years. When we get closer to the end of the year, we may look into ordering more of the Holiday CDs. We still have about 500 copies, but I expect we will possibly sell 200 to 300 copies by the end of the year. The write-off would save tax money, and the incoming board would have a good inventory. We'll look at that later and decide at that time.

Once again, I thank you all for your cooperation and attention at our meetings. I know our business meetings before break can get boring, but it is important for everyone to be informed about what's going on with the club and what your board is doing. I also know we've all attended noisy and chaotic meetings and jams that made it difficult to hear what is said and annoying to those who came to play. You guys have been absolutely wonderful. I appreciate that more than you know. It makes it easier for me and fun for all. Years ago I was taking management training in Houston Texas, and my instructor gave me a little poem that I remember to this day:----->

Hello again Silver Stringers, and welcome Spring!!! What turned out to be a really long, cold Winter seems to be over. . . finally (*sigh of relief*). Now it's time to turn our thoughts to the fun and music filled tradition we call the **Annual Silver Springs Dulcimer Society Campout at Myers Lake Campground** in Byron Michigan. The 2010 campout will be June 11-13. Details are on page #6. We have reserved two group campsites this year, and have again booked the great Elegant Catering for Saturday night dinner. **(signup sheets for set up and clean up helpers will be put out at club meetings starting in May)**

**The registration form for the Myers Lake Campground will be on the SSDS website and attendees must send their deposits directly to Myers Lake to reserve campsites.** The cost is \$30 per night for camp sites with 30 amp service (only twelve are available, in Area 3). Group Area 2 sites have 20-amp service for \$27 per night. Cabin Rentals require a minimum two-night stay at \$70 per night (4 cabins total, and currently only one cabin is available). Plan to attend this fun and memorable event.

**VARIETY NIGHT** is once again upon us. Thursday April 29<sup>th</sup>, your M.C. will be none other than our own "Perky Peggy" Kustra. Let's have a big turnout and a record-breaking number of spectacular acts (does anyone know what the record is?) As always, pizza, salad and beverages will be provided by the club. (Desserts are requested from our *incredible* bakers).

Yikes - It's been a very busy and great month! On March 7 we gave a concert that was part of the Lyell Lindsey Fine Arts Series at the First United Methodist Church of Ferndale. Karen Turner played a Webster hammered dulcimer that she had purchased from that Church, that had special significance for the very responsive, appreciative audience. We received a standing ovation after our performance, and the next day the contact person, Sue Shuller (a good violinist by the way), sent the following email: "Hi, Bert. I just wanted to thank you and the group again for your wonderful performance yesterday. It was truly a delightful afternoon, and we all enjoyed it so much!"

The rest of the gigs in March were celebrations of St. Patrick's Day. On March 11, we played for the Knights of Columbus Hall in Lincoln Park for the Downriver Association for the Blind and Visually Impaired. We loved playing for this lively group. A number of people got up and danced to our music. Many people expressed their thanks afterward, and the comments were great... including "On a scale of 1 to 10, your group was a 15!" and "We've had people performing for us here for the past 26 years, and your group was the best ever". We sold 21 CD's there. Please check out the beautiful letter on the next page that was sent to me by Maryeileen Hogan, the contact person for that gig. On March 16, we played for a great, very lively and large group at the Wayne-Westland Senior Club in Westland. There was a good-sized dance floor there and quite a number of people got up and danced to our music. One of the memorable moments was when Bob Hlavacek introduced the tune "Dancing Bear" and commented "That's spelled B-E-A-R", and someone in the audience shouted out "Oh Damn!" The next day (March 17, St. Patrick's Day) we played for the Inn at Cass Lake in Waterford. We had a great time and it was very clear that the audience did too. The activities director, Julie Turnes, a "dynamite" person, had originally called me in February, sounding panicked, because the band she had hired for St. Patrick's Day had just backed out. She was just out of the hospital after surgery, was telling me how much she loved working with the people in the retirement community, and how she couldn't wait (as she had been ordered to do), so she had her husband drive her down to the Inn at Cass Lake to reconnect with the people she loved so much. I told her, as I've done with quite a number of the great people I've dealt with in arranging our gigs, how lucky their residents are to have a person who cares so much about them. She was delighted with our performance and said she would be contacting us to play for their Christmas celebration in December. Larry Roper approached another interesting couple after our performance, because they were obviously having such a great time. They were heartily cheering after each of our tunes, and they turned out to not be residents of the Inn at Cass Lake, but they had seen us play in Ferndale on March 7, and had enjoyed the concert there so much. They checked out our website, saw that we were playing again at the Inn at Cass Lake later in the month, and they came just to see us play again. Another sidelight: Bob Niemzcewski, who was really cranking out a lot of good sound from his bass, had a string break with a loud snap toward the end of the performance. Larry, around the same time, had one of his suspenders let go with such vigor that it nearly wiped out the person standing behind him. When Karen Turner asked Larry to stand up during his solo on John Ryan's Polka, he responded that he couldn't because he was afraid his pants would fall down. On March 19, we played for American House in Royal Oak. We loved it! The audience loved it! After the gig, Angie, the activities director, had tears as she thanked us for our performance. She said "Thank you so much - The residents love your group. There is a very special connection here (between Silver Strings and the residents) - such wonderful energy". To end the great month of March, we played at Maple Heights Retirement Community. It was terrific, with lots of great feedback during and after our performance.

Many thanks to all of the musicians who have played for our gigs and done such a great job! I'm blown away by your energy and dedication and everything you pour into making each of these gigs a success. 


### NOTES FROM THE SOUNDBOARD

Rose Hines, Jim McKinney, Sue Tanner, Linda Adams, Robb Pilkerton, Mary & Stan Finn, Penny Scheiber, Marie Naster, Karen Missavage, Karl Malwitz and Sandi Hlavacek have all contributed to the evolution of the newsletter you see today.



After many changes in its 25 years, this is the 300<sup>th</sup> issue of the Silver Strings "Soundboard" newsletter, which is now distributed to our 151 dues-paid members and the world, primarily through our internet website. This has saved a lot of paper, and printing and postage costs.
